# TIRELESS MOTHER

*No preface to an Annual Report could be more expressive of the aims and ambitions of the Jewish General Hospital than the following, contributed recently by Bella B. Kalter, R.N., one of the Hospital's nurses, to "The Canadian Jewish Chronicle."*

In our city there stands a building which looks very much like any other building of its sort—an institution. We go by it often; sometimes we go inside it to visit the sick; sometimes we enter its doors and remain awhile. Some of us work there.

On the bus at the corner of Cote des Neiges and St. Catherine Road the driver calls out "Jewish General Hospital—Hôpital Juif" It has become a familiar sound—to the Jewish speaking people, to the English and to the French. When something becomes familiar we sometimes forget its significance. We begin to take it for granted.

It is a good thing to take cognizance of the valuable things in our lives. It is good to think of and value our blessings while we have them. Let us stop for a minute and think of this institution—the Jewish General Hospital—and realize what a blessing it is to the Jewish community of Montreal.

I enter the building every day. I spend the greater part of the day there and then I walk out of its great doors into a busy indifferent world. That's what strikes me most at the end of a busy day at the hospital—the difference between its zealous interest in the people that enter its doors to the apathetic attitude that man has toward man in the outside world.

Perhaps I should be becoming poetic if I described the Jewish General Hospital as the tireless mother of a whole community. Yet I cannot think of a better simile with which to compare our hospital in a word less soft than "Mother". A city of people with aches and pains run to the hospital and seek her confidence. Thousands of bewildered and frightened people seek comfort and consolation there. And as we may forget the

patient care bestowed upon us by our mothers when we were little children, so may we sometimes forget the haven our hospital has been to us when we were ill.

Just try to imagine this city exactly as it is—but without the Jewish General Hospital which stands with its doors open to all the people of this community, Gentile and Jew, rich and poor. Think of the times that you have run there in frantic haste and try to imagine what you would have done if you had had to knock on a stranger's door.

There is where the significance and wonder of the hospital lies. It is your own. It knows no strangers. Everyone is welcome—everyone is treated with the same respect and courtesy—with the same consideration. The French who speak no English, the English who speak no Jewish, the Jewish who speak neither English nor French. Think, where would all our refugees—the people who were driven from their homes in Europe—have gone to find help for all their ailments! Other hospitals may have admitted them; but who should have spoken to them—who should have comforted these frightened lonely people who have not yet learned the language of their new home!

These thoughts about our hospital have come to me many times. But lately, perhaps since these frightened refugees have frequented the hospital in such great numbers, have I become aware of its kindness and its generosity and of its indispensability. It has become more than a building with doors and walls—more than an institution which administers to the sick. I can feel a great heart beating there—a heart which functions to give life and happiness to all people.

# REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

## To the Governors of The Jewish General Hospital:

On behalf of the Board of Administration, I have the honour to submit for your approval the Fourteenth Annual Report for the year ended December 31st, 1947.

The Jewish Community in general and the Governors of the Hospital in particular will derive great satisfaction from the Hospital's record of service for the year under review. Operating as it has at or close to capacity during the past 10 years, the Hospital has in this year rendered the largest volume of service in its history. The truly non-sectarian character of our Hospital is demonstrated by the following record of service. Of the 5,684 patients to enter the Hospital during the year, almost 25% were of non-Jewish faiths. Of these, 759 were Catholics, 514 were Protestants and 77 were of other non-Jewish faiths. In the Out-Patient Department more than 7000 visits or 25% of the total, were made by patients of faiths other than Jewish. That the Jewish Community of Montreal was able to make this contribution towards the health and welfare of the citizens of our City, without regard to race, creed or financial status is a source of gratification.

You have heard from the Report of the Superintendent that many problems were encountered in the administration of the Hospital. These, however, were not problems peculiar to our own Hospital. They were rather the difficulties which all voluntary hospitals face to-day. Not the least of these, is the problem of financing the continuously increasing cost of the ever-expanding service to the patient.

Expenses for the year exceeded income by \$151,953.00. While Hospital deficits have long ceased to be a surprise to the Communities which support them, private philanthropy cannot, under existing conditions, continue to carry the increasing burden which is being placed on it. Deficits result from dispensing service below cost and our Hospitals incur their greatest loss on the service rendered to those patients who qualify as indigents under the Quebec Public Charities Act. With

operating costs at about \$10.00 per day, the \$4.00 per diem granted under the Q.P.C.A. is no longer adequate. It is hoped that our Provincial Government which manifests such a keen interest in the health of its citizens and the welfare of its institutions, will soon give serious thought to this pressing problem which threatens the security of our Hospitals.

Whilst we, in common with other Hospitals, have been compelled to make nominal rate increases, these have not been sufficient to cover mounting costs of operation. Nor can we continue to pass on these higher costs to the patient of moderate means, who has already reached the straining point in his attempt to pay his own way. To be sure, Blue Cross Insurance has been of great assistance to thousands who otherwise would have suffered serious hardship. It must be borne in mind, however, that in order that hospitals may be adequately compensated for services rendered, subscription rates under Blue Cross may have to be increased. We are confident, that continued close co-operation between Blue Cross and its member hospitals will result in developments which will serve the best interests of the public and preserve the voluntary principle of our Hospitals.

It is encouraging to note that the Federal Government has recently given recognition to the fundamental problems of health amongst the citizens of our Country. We trust that by mutual understanding between Provincial and Dominion Authorities, our Hospitals will derive the greatest benefits possible from the aid program outlined by the Federal Government.

At this point, I should like to pay tribute to the members of our Community who, from the inception of the Hospital, demonstrated a willing generosity in order that our Hospital should be maintained in accordance with the highest standards. For the past 7 years, we have received our major support through the Combined Jewish Appeal. In 1947 this Appeal was conducted under the capable leadership of Mr. Joseph Lefcoe, and I want to pay this public tribute to Mr. Lefcoe for his energetic



and devoted efforts which resulted in such brilliant success. To all those who worked with Mr. Lefcoe and to the thousands who responded so generously, we are equally grateful.

The Medical Board, under the Chairmanship of Dr. Geo. J. Strean, has capably guided the medical aspects of the Hospital's operation. We are grateful to the chairman and members of the Medical Board for their untiring efforts and for their devotion to the ideal of making the Jewish General Hospital an institution of high scientific achievement.

No report of the Hospital's activities may be considered complete without making reference to the role which the Women's Auxiliary plays in the life of the Hospital. The year 1947 was marked by the retirement of Mrs. Alton Goldbloom from the office of President. No greater tribute can be paid to Mrs. Goldbloom for her years of outstanding leadership and service, than that which was paid her by her associates at the time of her retirement. The Testimonial Luncheon which marked the establishment in Mrs. Goldbloom's name of an annual award to be made to a student in the Projected Nurses' Training School constitutes a tribute in keeping with the splendid service rendered by Mrs. Goldbloom. The memorable function, in which your Board of Administration was privileged to participate, will remain always as an inspiration to those who devote themselves to the needs of the Community. In leaving the office of President, Mrs. Goldbloom must derive that inner satisfaction which comes from successful achievement. She may well look with justifiable pride on the magnificent organization to the building of which she contributed so much. To Mrs. E. Lozinski, who succeeds Mrs. Goldbloom, we extend our best wishes and fullest co-operation. Mrs. Lozinski's long record as a leader assures the continued success of the Auxiliary. I should like to record our deepest appreciation and thanks to the officers and members of the Auxiliary for their constant and energetic devotion to the Hospital and its needs.

While I know all of you have been interested in the few highlights from the year's activities, which we have presented to you, I am aware that you are anxious to know what developments have taken place in our plans for the future. I am pleased to tell you that much progress has been made since our last report to you. Plans and specifications for our Nurses' Residence and Training School have been completed and approved by your Board of Administration. Tenders have been called and construction will commence as soon as contracts have been negotiated. Meanwhile, plans for the other additions to the Hospital's facilities, which have been subjected to exhaustive study, are now being finalized. The entire building program will be proceeded with and so co-ordinated as to result in a minimum of disruption to existing services.





## REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT, Continued

With construction costs at their present high level, it becomes immediately apparent that the funds raised in 1945 are not sufficient to finance our building program. We are hopeful, however, that the Province of Quebec and the City of Montreal will give recognition to the Hospital's record of service by making generous grants so that we may be enabled to carry out the expansion program which we have developed and which constitutes our minimum needs.

We call upon those who have not yet completed full payment of their pledges, to do so without delay. At the same time we appeal to those in our Community who may not have subscribed to the Building Extension Fund, to take advantage of the opportunity to participate in this historic growth of one of our Community's most vital Institutions.

We have frequently referred to our interest in developing the Hospital as a center of education for our physicians and as an institution devoted to the best traditions of scientific medicine. With the approach of the realization of our Expansion Program, which will provide ample physical facilities for these activities, your Board of Administration has established a Committee on Scientific Development composed of members of the Board of Administration and Medical Board. This Committee will evolve a broad plan for the Hospital's Scientific progress and lay down the policies which will guide us in the achievement of our goal. In this manner shall we best be able to utilize the excellent skills of the members of our Staff and thereby contribute further to the knowledge of Medicine and the prestige of our Community.

I record once again my deep appreciation and thanks to my associates on the Board of Administration, for their unfailing co-operation. The years which lie ahead will be crowded with activity for all members of the Board. Much sacrifice of time and energy will be called for, and I know from their past records that they will not be found wanting. To the members of the Board of Trustees, I am grateful for their continued interest and co-operation.

Grateful thanks are due to Mr. M. M. Sperber, K.C., Honorary Legal Adviser, Mr. H. E. Herschorn, Honorary Notary and Messrs. Mendelsohn Brothers, Customs Brokers, all of whom have rendered service without fee.

The Jewish Public Library continues to render service to our patients and we are deeply grateful for their assistance. The English and Jewish Press have given us splendid co-operation throughout the year and we extend to them our thanks and appreciation.

To Mr. S. S. Cohen, our Superintendent, we again record our thanks for his continued loyal service and we wish to convey through him, our appreciation to his associates, Department Heads and various Staffs, for their devotion. You have heard this evening of the many and difficult problems encountered in the day-to-day operation of the Hospital. That these problems and difficulties have been met and overcome, and that smooth and efficient service has been rendered without interruption, constitutes a tribute to Mr. Cohen and his co-workers and we are glad of the opportunity to express to them this well deserved recognition.

Looked at broadly and in perspective, the past record of the Jewish General Hospital is such as to bring a sense of pride and satisfaction to all those who have played a part in its progress. As we look ahead we can not help but feel that the Hospital is on the threshold of a future of even greater promise. We shall go forward with confidence and with resolute determination, secure in the knowledge that we are fulfilling our Community's recognition of the need for a greater Jewish General Hospital, —a greater Tribute Everlasting to all who participate in making it greater.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

## To the Governors of The Jewish General Hospital:

I have the honour to submit the Treasurer's Report, in connection with the Financial Statements for the year 1947.

Expenses for the year totaled \$663,582.00, an increase of \$122,535.08 over 1946. As indicated in the Superintendent's Report, this increase was due to the higher cost of practically every item which enters the Hospital budget. Revenue from patients amounted to \$511,628.16, an increase of \$111,386.35. The higher income resulted from increased rates which were put into effect during the year. The Operating Deficit for the year was \$151,953.84, as compared with \$140,815.11 for the year 1946—an increase of \$11,138.73. Net non-operating income from Combined Jewish Appeal, sundry donations, Women's Auxiliary and income from investments totaled \$136,441.93, resulting in a net deficit of \$15,511.91.

Our Endowment Fund which now totals \$74,334.79, received only slight encouragement during the year. We again urge all our friends to remember the Hospital when making their wills. By so doing, they will let their

generosity live on and safeguard the continuation of our services in accordance with the highest standards.

We have in our Building Extension Fund a total of \$1,149,991.49. At the close of the year, unpaid pledges totaled \$156,564.59. While some of this amount has been paid since the beginning of the current year, there is still a considerable sum outstanding. I need hardly stress the necessity for collecting every dollar pledged before we can embark on our building program.

In concluding this brief summary of the financial highlights for the year 1947, I should like to pay tribute to the generosity of our Community, which each year has given tangible evidence of its growing interest in the welfare of our Hospital.

Vouchers for all disbursements have been duly examined and all financial transactions have been verified. Your Bankers have confirmed Bank Balances by means of certificates. Cash and Cheques on Hand have been duly verified and checked. Securities have been verified by certificate of the depositories. Inventories are shown in accordance with figures submitted by your Superintendent.

There is, in addition to liabilities shown on your Balance Sheet, a deferred liability of \$7,400.00 for appropriation taxes to the City of Montreal. This amount is payable, plus interest, in five equal instalments an-

nually. A contingent liability in respect of the issue of \$300,000.00 of 5% Serial Debentures, due 1932-1951, by the Jewish Hospital Campaign Committee Inc., and guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Government of the Province of Quebec, remains outstanding to the amount of \$85,000.00.

Your Statement of Income and Expenses on Hospital Operations for the year 1947 indicates a net operating loss of \$151,953.84.

Net Non-Operating Income for the year 1947 represented by contributions from Combined Jewish Appeal Funds, Investment Income, Donations, etc., amounted to \$136,441.93.

Subject to the foregoing, we certify that the attached statements correctly set forth the position of the Jewish General Hospital as on 31st December, 1947 and the results of the operations for the year ended 31st December, 1947, according to the best of our information and the explanations given us, and as shown by your books and records.

We desire to express our deep appreciation to your Superintendent, Mr. S. S. Cohen, to Mr. M. Segal, and to Mr. Frederick M. Goldstein, as well as to your office staff, for the kind cooperation and assistance rendered us during the course of our audits.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

MR. ALLAN BRONFMAN, *President*,  
JEWISH GENERAL HOSPITAL, MONTREAL.

Sir:

I have the honour to submit for your approval the Fourteenth Annual Report of the Superintendent for the year ended December 31st, 1947.

The Hospital has, in 1947, completed the most active year since its opening in 1934. Admissions totaled 5,684, an increase of 435 over 1946. These patients received a total of 61,279 days of treatment. Continued improvement in the management of the hospitalized patient has led to a further reduction in the length of time patients remain in the hospital. The average stay for the year 1947 was 10.7 days as compared with 11.4 days in 1946. Although the increased turnover enabled us to give care to more patients, we were, as in previous years, unable to meet the demand for hospitalization. The pressure for admission of emergency and urgent cases made it utterly impossible for us to cope with the demand for admission of elective cases. By denying prompt admission to this large group of patients, we are nullifying the benefits accomplished through public education in the interests of preventative treatment. Lack of accommodation, if permitted to continue, constitutes a serious threat to public health. Fortunately, we are now on the threshold of implementing our building expansion program and thus shall we avoid the loss of those precious gains achieved through years of painstaking effort directed towards improving the health of our Community.

The Out-Patient Department showed greater activity in keeping with the general increase in the demand for the Hospital's services. A total of 29,100 visits was recorded during the year, which represents an increase of 2,742 visits over 1946.

The Institutional mortality was reduced to 1.5% as compared with 1.7% for the previous year.

Surgical operations totaled 4,963 an increase of 797 over 1946.

The Laboratories, with a marked increase in the volume of work performed, continue to operate under difficulties resulting from inadequate space. Neverthe-

less, the Department kept abreast of every development in the diagnostic field and rendered excellent service to patient and physician throughout the year.

The X-Ray Department was equally taxed by increasing demands on both the diagnostic and therapeutic branches. We are pleased to report that in order to meet this demand, the Department was completely remodelled and new equipment was installed to replace the inadequate apparatus which has served since the opening of the Hospital. The installation which was started towards the close of the year under review, was completed early in 1948. The equipment embodies the most recent developments in Radiography and Fluoroscopy and includes such advances as photo-electric timing and other technical refinements. The apparatus also includes facilities for planography, which has proven its value in diagnostic radiology. This equipment will form the nucleus of the expanded Department which is incorporated in our expansion plans.

The Obstetrical Department added further to its brilliant record by completing the year without the loss of a mother. The birth of 1266 infants was recorded during the year, representing an increase of 147 births over 1946, and the largest number to be born in any year since the opening of the hospital. 1947 marks the completion of 8 years during which we have had the good fortune not to experience a single maternal death, and brings to almost 9000 the number of deliveries consecutively carried out with a maternal mortality of zero.

Although major expansion of Departments awaits completion of our Building Program, a number of new services have nevertheless been inaugurated during the year. A Sterility Clinic has been established under the joint direction of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology and the Department of Urology. In the short time which has elapsed since the opening of the Clinic, a considerable service has been rendered to patients as well as physicians who have freely utilized its consultation service.

The Department of Neuro-Psychiatry established a clinic for the administration of electric shock to ambulatory patients. This clinic has provided a need which has long been felt and constitutes a valuable addition to the facilities for the management of the mentally ill, facilities which are woefully deficient in our general



hospitals. The necessity for making adequate provision for the care of certain types of mental patients within the framework of the general hospital, is becoming increasingly important, and such provision is visualized in our expansion plans.

The Tumor Clinic continues to render important service to the many cancer cases which come to its attention. The patients receive the benefits of group consultation by experts in their respective fields and close follow-up is maintained so that most effective results may be achieved. The Tumor Clinic in co-operation with the Life Saving Fund of the Women's Auxiliary, continued the sponsorship of the lecture series on cancer inaugurated last year. The fourth and fifth lectures in this series were given by Dr. Peter Heinbecker of St. Louis and Dr. Maurice Lenz of New York respectively. Dr. Heinbecker, Clinical Professor of Surgery at Washington University and an outstanding experimental Surgeon, spoke on Adrenal Tumors. Dr. Lenz, Professor of clinical Radiology at Columbia University and an international authority on cancer therapy, lectured on the treatment of breast cancer. Both lectures attracted capacity audiences which were representative of the medical profession of the city as a whole.

The Medical Board, under the Chairmanship of Dr. Geo. J. Streen, continues to give effective guidance to the development and maintenance of the policies which determine the scientific standards of the Hospital.

The professional work of the Hospital enjoys the esteem and regard of our own Community, as well as of the City at large, and this constitutes a tribute to the skill, devotion and co-operative effort of the entire medical staff. I should like to express my own appreciation to the Chairman and members of the Medical Board, the Chiefs of the various services and Departments, as well as to their respective staffs for their interest and splendid co-operation.

Difficulty in maintaining adequate staff during the year was again experienced in both domestic and professional departments. Shortage of nursing personnel made the rendering of good care to an increased number of patients a particularly difficult problem. Only by selfless devotion, resourceful planning and hard work on the part of our staff, were we able to fulfill with gratifying results, our obligations to the patients entrusted to us. To the Department Heads and to those who serve with them, I record my sincere thanks and appreciation for their loyal and devoted service.

Our Farm Project, always a factor in the economy of our food service, takes on new significance in these days

of high cost of all vegetables and non-availability of many others. It served as a constant source of supply of fresh vegetables not otherwise obtainable. You will, I am sure, be interested in a few figures which will give some indication of the extent of our farm. In 1947 we grew some 15 tons of tomatoes, 3 tons of carrots, 2 tons of onions, 2 tons of beets and 6000 head of cabbage. In addition, large quantities of lettuce, celery, cucumbers, corn, peas, beans and many other vegetables were grown. You will readily appreciate how much the farm contributed to the economical administration of our food service in this year of vastly increased costs.

In the maintenance of the building, we experienced some difficulty with regard to the masonry. After consultation with our architects and other experts in this field, rather extensive repairs were carried out. We are confident that we have now permanently eliminated the possibility of further defects in this regard.

As is to be expected, the rising cost of all supplies, food and services, is reflected in markedly higher operating expenses. The introduction of new, and more extensive use of other costly drugs has added further to increased expenditures. It is not surprising therefore that operating costs have reached an all time high of more than \$10.00 per day. Our deficit, is as always, accounted for by the large volume of service given to patients in the public wards, as well as in the Out-Patient Department at a fraction of cost.

The Women's Auxiliary again fully met the obligations it has assumed from year to year. Mrs. Alton Goldbloom, President of the Auxiliary from its inception, retired from that office at the close of the year. Mrs. Goldbloom has served the Auxiliary and Hospital through 12 eventful years and in that period has established a pattern and example for women's organizations throughout the Dominion. The Auxiliary has chosen as Mrs. Goldbloom's successor, Mrs. Ezra Lozinski, a communal worker of proven ability and a leader who has already demonstrated her interest in and devotion to the Auxiliary and Hospital. That Mrs. Goldbloom will continue her active participation in the Auxiliary's work is an added source of assurance to us.

The Life Saving Fund, which has, through the years, become a vital and indeed indispensable arm of the Hospital, has undergone a change in direction with the retirement of Mrs. Allan Bronfman, Chairman of the Fund from the time of its founding. The energetic personal service and splendid direction which Mrs. Bronfman gave to the Life Saving Fund is reflected in its growth from 33 members in 1936 to 622 in 1947. It is difficult to attempt at this time a review of the benefits which the Hospital

has derived from the Life Saving Fund. It has made possible the granting, without restriction, of every conceivable measure necessary for the treatment of our underprivileged sick. The Life Saving Fund will remain always a tribute everlasting to Mrs. Allan Bronfman, who gave so much of herself to its development. The Direction of the Fund has now been placed in the capable hands of Mrs. Julius Block, whose ability as a leader is well known in the community. In paying tribute to the Women's Auxiliary, I express my deep gratitude to the officers, Executive, Board Members and membership at large, for their unflagging devotion. We recall with great pleasure the visit of Her Excellency, Lady Alexander of Tunis, on November 8th. Her Excellency came on the invitation of the Women's Auxiliary, which she has graced with her honorary patronage. Lady Alexander inspected the Hospital and showed unusual interest in the many activities of the Hospital and Auxiliary.

In the discharge of my administrative duties, I have had, throughout, the understanding support of the members of the Board of Administration and its various Committees. I am truly grateful to all of them for their assistance. To you, Mr. President, I am again indebted for the guidance and sound advice you have so freely given me at all times. I continue to derive inspiration from the keen interest you manifest in the many problems which confront the Hospital.

The year just concluded has in many ways been trying and disappointing. Improvement in conditions which we had hoped would occur during the year, unfortunately, did not take place. The persistent and growing demand for hospital accommodation and our inability to cope with it, led to untold difficulty. Increasing cost of operation and a diminishing ability on the part of the average individual to meet such cost, is a matter of deep concern to all welfare workers. Shortage of trained staff and of unskilled help, added further to our problems. Nevertheless, we feel that the Community may well look with pride on the record of service achieved during the past year when care of high excellence was rendered to such a large number of patients.

The Jewish General Hospital is now entering upon an important phase in its development. With the skill, loyalty and devotion of its physicians and staff, the intelligent leadership of its Board of Administration and the support of a generous Community, it can not fail in its high purpose.

# WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

## Report of the President

January 7th, 1948.

### FELLOW-MEMBERS:

It is not without mixed sentiments and emotions that I inscribe for the record, the twelfth annual report of the Women's Auxiliary of the Jewish General Hospital, together with a brief evaluation of the passing years. For this is the final report that it will be my privilege to prepare as your president. The twelve years that belong to history have been extremely meaningful to many who are amongst my listeners today. In the planning, creation and building of our services have gone endless hours and years of toil that eventually led to the fulfillment of our undertakings.

Turning back the pages to January 1936, when we came into being as an organized group, and travelling step by step through the years, brings to mind the undertaking of a constantly increasing series of activities and interests, all designed to give greater aid to every hospital department and which always imposed a greater burden of service on our magnificent volunteers. How often I have travelled through the highways and byways of memory and marvelled at the courage and stamina of those who gave so generously of themselves. I am moved by gratitude that mine was the opportunity to guide and be part of so colossal an effort and so fruitful a result. The strain upon one's ingenuity and energy was at times taxing in the extreme.

Inspired always to do all that was possible to give aid towards alleviating pain and suffering, we were not primarily dominated by the idea of fund-raising as the ultimate in hospital service. Rather did we create ourselves as a body, dedicated to interpreting the value of the hospital to community welfare, and stressed its right to the interest, service and support of all. Guided by that thought, we set out to build a large and all-inclusive family membership, from the enrollment of the infant in the cradle to the matriarch. We were not unmindful that dues could be productive of a sizeable and dependable income. It was a feature we hoped for and anticipated. We undertook our commitments to benefit the hospital accordingly. A clearly specified and limited program of special fund-raising events augmented our income through the years and permitted us contributions to special needs brought to our attention.

At the end of this our twelfth year, we report with thankfulness, the handsome overall revenue of approximately \$230,000.00. It is not difficult of understanding that only a supreme voluntary effort could have produced such results, particularly when we realize that much of our funds was collected in single dollars. Only with a senior membership of 2,945 inclusive of patronesses to the life saving fund, 4,049 children's nursery fund members and 102 juniors could such a record be established, at this, the close of our twelfth year.

To say that the Women's Auxiliary as a public relations body has had a marked influence upon the chronicle for good which stands to the credit of the Jewish General Hospital, is a fact of which we are justly proud. At this time, it would be superfluous to give a detailed review of our contributions and services, for a ten year account of the highlights is to be found in our "Memoirs of Mercy", a booklet dedicated to the members of the Women's Auxiliary. Suffice it to say, that the benefits to hospital and patient are indelibly woven into the beneficent history of the hospital. All of which fills me with humility and appreciation for the tie that bound me to a group of women capable of such extraordinary devotion to a worthy cause, and so responsive to the demands I made upon their time, energy, intelligence and talents. The gift of their friendship, loyalty and affection, will remain for me a treasured souvenir for all time.

I look back with pride upon the honour and distinction we have enjoyed in having the Lady Tweedsmuir, Her Royal Highness, the Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone and Her Excellency the Lady Alexander of Tunis as our Honorary Patronesses. The visits of Her Royal Highness Princess Alice and of Her Excellency, Viscountess Alexander are memorable events that afforded us both pleasure and satisfaction. Their interest in every phase of hospital service and efficiency was most gratifying. The further honour they bestowed upon us by being our gracious guests at tea, enhanced for us the importance of the occasions.

It is well for me to pause at this eventful moment and recall with appreciation those who so significantly guided and contributed to our founding years. They have left a marked impression for good upon the Women's Auxiliary.

We remember gratefully Mr. Horace Cohen, O.B.E., who headed the men's committee that sponsored our creation; Mr. Isidore Ballon, K.C., who gave us legal guidance and obtained our charter and by-laws; we remain in his debt. Mrs. Samuel Bronfman, O.B.E.; Mrs. C. J. Gross, now Mrs. Charles Kauvar of Denver, Colo.; Mrs. Samuel Leopold; Mrs. A. Raginsky, Sr.; Mrs. Joseph Kruger and Mrs. Maurice Greenblatt, are past founder officers, to be recalled to mind for their worthwhile contribution to our beginnings. And our esteemed Executive Council, Mrs. David Tannenbaum, Mrs. Victor Michaels and Mrs. L. K. Freedman, who served devotedly for ten years as officers and continue to give us of their valuable advice. Indeed there are many others deserving of our high praise for their part in our achievement. Neither time nor space permits the inclusion of their names in this report. To all who have in any way served us, I express a heartfelt thank you.

There are many occasions and events in our past history which we so often contemplate in gratitude. No single undertaking that comes to mind, brought greater satisfaction to all of us than the subscription campaign and drawing on a mink coat, generously donated by Holt Renfrew & Co. A wealth of energy was directed in the planning of this fund-raising event and the resultant success made possible a donation of \$25,000 to the Nurses' Home and Training School, soon to be built. Another donation of \$25,000 from our funds, for the Laboratory Building made the Women's Auxiliary contribution to the hospital building campaign a total of \$50,000. Certainly we will always retain a deep sense of pride in that achievement and an appreciation of all those who were part of so tremendous an endeavor.

Mrs. Allan Bronfman, whose keen sympathy for the sick and underprivileged, made of her an ideal chairman of the life-saving fund, is responsible for one of the brightest pages in our Women's Auxiliary history. Appreciating the urgency and necessity of providing a fund adequate to furnish all life-saving measures to patients in the hospital, without regard to their means, race or creed, Mrs. Bronfman set about to interpret life-saving in its relation to the hospital, to a generous and understanding community.

The measure of her service can best be told when it is recalled that at the end of 1936 we find 33 patronesses supporting the life-saving fund, while the year just ended records 622 subscribers. It is no exaggeration to say that much of the success attained is due to the personal devotion and interest of Mrs. Bronfman. The medical and administrative staffs have been warmly appreciative of the aid provided the sick through this fund. Many have passed through the doors of the hospital who have reason to be grateful, not only to the

skill of its physicians and the devoted attention of the nursing staff, but for the emergency life-saving measures made financially possible.

It is with unusual satisfaction that we report an overall income in 1947 of \$16,432.50 in the life-saving fund. During the past year, a project undertaken by the Women's Auxiliary and sponsored through the life-saving fund was a series of lectures on cancer and its related diseases. These lectures, given by famed authorities in their respective fields, were accorded high praise and warmly received by the medical profession. The speakers were Dr. Gordon E. Richards, famed Radiologist and scientist from Toronto, who also spoke to our Auxiliary; Dr. George N. Papanicolaou, associate professor of anatomy of Cornell University Medical College, and originator of the cytology method of cancer diagnosis, now widely used; Dr. Henry L. Jaffe, clinical professor of pathology, New York University Medical College, and director of laboratories and pathologist to the Hospital of Joint Diseases in New York; and Dr. Peter Heinbecker, clinical professor of surgery, Washington University, St. Louis, Mo., were the four distinguished lecturers who contributed much of medical and scientific interest during their visits.

The fund provided an artificial kidney at a cost of \$1,102.52; we devoted \$1,500 for the vitamin and special drug needs of the obstetrical clinics; we contributed \$2,000 for the purchase of penicillin; \$500 was given for insulin for the out-patient department; a fund of \$500 made possible small instrument replacements; \$945 provided the cost of prothrombin; \$300 was used for investigative work in vaginal cytology; \$280 purchased new oxygen tent hoods; taxi service was provided for needy patients at an outlay of \$174.50; the tumor clinic lectures called for an expenditure of \$292.01; the salary paid to the tumor clinic worker was \$784.68 and \$3,123.50 was requisitioned for life-saving measures for non-paying patients. I wish it were possible to review the tremendous service and the unending list of equipment which this fund has provided to the hospital during the past twelve years. Our memory can be both refreshed and satisfied by referring to our historical booklet "Memoirs of Mercy", for a ten year account.

The contents of the life-saving fund will remain a tribute everlasting to Mrs. Allan Bronfman, to that esteemed and generous group of subscribers, known distinctively as patronesses to the life-saving fund, and to all who served this noble undertaking in any capacity. Our chairman has won for herself the admiration and high esteem of all her associates. We shall ever bear in mind Mrs. Bronfman's whole-hearted devotion to her undertaking and the graciousness and generosity of her

hospitality in furthering the good work of the Women's Auxiliary. I shall personally remember in affectionate thought the great measure of her service to a noble aim. While Mrs. Bronfman is retiring as the active head of this fund, we are delighted to realize that her interest will continue as honorary chairman of the life-saving fund.

Mrs. David Tannenbaum, who has maintained the records of the donations to the life-saving fund, has given to her task an ever faithful and efficient devotion. She reports \$882.50 gratefully received and acknowledged. We are warmly appreciative of the many generous donors whose material assistance broadened the scope of our service to the sick. Mrs. Tannenbaum merits our high praise for her unflagging interest in Women's Auxiliary endeavours. We remember her with gratitude as one of the editors of "Memoirs of Mercy", a valued historical booklet and prized by all of us.

Mrs. M. J. Raff, as chairman of membership since our inception, has given a leadership to her undertaking, distinguished not only for the wisdom of her direction, but for an attainment of great magnitude. The high degree of her intelligence, together with a loyalty and enthusiasm for service to the hospital, combined to make her a tower of strength within our ranks. Indeed I recognize my personal indebtedness to her for her responsiveness to my ever present request to plan and strive for an increase in membership. Mrs. Raff's sincerity of purpose and capacity for devotion to duty, is markedly illustrated by the closeness of her affiliation to all that was undertaken by the Women's Auxiliary for hospital welfare.

At the close of the first year of our existence, we had a membership of 2,004 and the completion of this our twelfth year, the peak in our registration has been reached with 2,945 members in good standing. As the main source of our financial strength was recognized as income from dues, that knowledge placed a rather heavy burden upon our chairman. The expenditure of \$9,478.91 for linens; \$724.30 for silver replacements and \$2,020.74 which included salary to our office worker, printing, stationery, office supplies, stamps and telephone during 1947, but illustrates how great have been our annual commitments. It is well to note at this point the urgent need of payment of dues in order that the Women's Auxiliary purse shall be adequate to the demands this year.

Mrs. Raff may well view with satisfaction the result of her labours. We in turn acclaim her for her colossal achievement, which knew neither limitation of time nor energy in the accomplishment of her task. As one of the editors of "Memoirs of Mercy", she has created that which will remain to her everlasting credit. We value not only the quality of the service she has rendered, but the generosity of spirit in which she served. In expressing to Mrs. Raff the gratitude of her associates for the signal part she has played in our welfare work, we would also assure her of our pleasure in the knowledge that she is carrying on.

Mrs. Harry Singer, our chairman of voluntary service, has been a highly esteemed officer not only for her efforts but for the wisdom of her judgment. With many years of community service behind her, Mrs. Singer brought to us the benefits of her vast experience.

Through the war years we were called upon to sustain a high level of voluntary aid in all departments of the hospital. This was no easy task in the face of a constantly dwindling nursing and domestic personnel. That we were successful in supplying a measure of assistance, is to the credit of Mrs. Singer who devoted herself to the need. We recall with gratitude the fine service rendered by her in the early years of fund-raising events. Her graciousness has been an attribute we have valued throughout our happy association.

We welcome her to our Executive Council, from where we will have the benefit of her wise counsel and continued interest. I would give to her the assurance of my personal high regard and gratitude of her associates for the years we served together a cause close to all our hearts.

Mrs. J. Rubin and Mrs. J. Schulman, our co-chairmen of the Children's Nursery Fund, have written, by their superb efforts of organization and direction, one of the brightest pages in the annals of our endeavours. This service was founded in 1937 with Mrs. Rubin as its head and the following year she was joined by Mrs. Schulman as co-chairman. They together have stimulated a steady growth, and today our members, found in the cradle, the nursery and the school, number 4,049 as of December 15, 1947. To translate into terms of labour so large a membership, necessitating a year-'round follow-up service, is to appreciate the colossal effort of maintenance, with an annual fee of one dollar, renewable on the date of birth of our child members and served by a birthday



card as a reminder. The clerical, telephone and collection service which it entails is of considerable magnitude, to say the least. It is to be noted that of the 4,049 total membership, 841 are new, 3,243 are renewals and 45 were transferred to the Women's Auxiliary Junior age group. The annual contribution of \$450 was made to the hospital for the drug and vitamin needs of the non-paying newborns, \$500 was added to our funds to aid in the payment of linens, as well as cost defrayed for the linen requisitions for the children's wards and nursery, and \$5,000 is earmarked to provide equipment for a premature nursery.

We may well congratulate ourselves on the leadership of this extraordinary effort. The devotion and enthusiasm of Mrs. Rubin and Mrs. Schulman for their undertaking has had an infectious influence upon the many who give service to this department. They are leaders to take pride in for the spirit in which they serve and for an unswerving loyalty to their responsibilities and the cause to which they have dedicated themselves. I take particular pride in their success and value our association with them. We give to them the heartfelt thanks of their fellow-workers and assure them of our highest regard.

Appreciation and thanks are due the kind friends who made donations totaling \$332.70 to this fund. To our patronesses, board and auxiliary members, whose unusual devotion and service made the above report possible, we express our sincere gratitude.

And we are much in debt to those children and parents whose support has helped to write so fine a record.

Miss Dorothy M. Hart, our honorary treasurer, and Mrs. Samuel Hershon, our financial secretary, have handled our funds with meticulous care and efficiency. The impeccable quality of their service has contributed greatly to the smooth running of our affairs. With an income of \$28,964.67 and a total expenditure of \$25,680.71 there was involved an overwhelming amount of clerical work. We pay tribute to Miss Hart for ten years of intensive and distinguished service in which we took great pride. Miss Hart has been an officer who gave to her great responsibility that irreproachable quality of service that made her an invaluable associate. It is a pleasure to welcome her to our Executive Council from whence we will continue to benefit from her high-mindedness and experience. Both Miss Hart and Mrs. Hershon will find recompense in the great esteem in which they are held and we give to them the warmest thanks of their co-workers.

Our devoted and efficient secretaries, Mrs. George J. Strean, Mrs. Z. I. Diner and Mrs. Sydney Lithwick,

have given of themselves without stint of time or convenience to their demanding tasks. Their responsiveness illustrates very markedly the spirit of service which has influenced our endeavours. Mrs. Strean was called upon to send 111 letters of both congratulation and sympathy, as well as to look after hotel arrangements for meetings. There is no phase of auxiliary activity that did not find her a liaison officer par excellence. We are very much in her debt. Mrs. Z. I. Diner has borne the great burden of preparing all notices of meetings and supervising the printing and stationery supplies for all committees. Her excellent qualifications found scope for expression in the fine service Mrs. Diner rendered. She merits our warmest appreciation. Mrs. Sydney Lithwick, as recording secretary, has maintained an excellent record of the business of our meetings. We express to her our sincere thanks for her co-operation and service to all that pertains to hospital welfare.

Mrs. A. M. Wener, our chairman of linen purchasing, reports the unusually large expenditure of \$9,478.91 for linens and uniforms. During the war period, with the existing short supply of linens, it was impossible to obtain the complete requisitions. The availability of linens during the past year saw orders completed that were on file for some time past. Mrs. Wener has devoted herself faithfully to the task of keeping the hospital adequately supplied. She has earned our high esteem and regard not only for a task well done, but for her ever-present interest to all that pertains to hospital welfare. We are also indebted to Mr. Jack Klein, O.B.E., for facilitating the placing of our linen orders and we extend to him our warm appreciation for his co-operation.

Mrs. Joseph Simand, chairman of the Medical Library, reports an extremely active year, both for the large number of scientific works added to the library, the increased use by the staff of the splendid collection of medical books and for the faithful attendance of the voluntary librarians. It is heartening to report the receipt of \$510 in donations, gratefully received, marking joyous occasions and honouring the memory of dear departed. These generous donors will be found listed in the next issue of the hospital report. The Women's Auxiliary, as heretofore, contributed for the library \$250, \$102 of which was derived from our juniors. This took care of binding medical journals, subscriptions and additional medical books, requested by the staff. Mrs. Simand is to be congratulated for the efficient running of this valued service. Her cultural attainments made of her an ideal director of this department. We owe to her and her associates our warmest appreciation for their fine contribution to Women's Auxiliary endeavors.

Mrs. Jack Klein, chairman of layettes, reports the distribution of 7 layettes to needy mothers during 1947.

With an ample supply of baby garments and Mrs. Klein's own continued generosity in providing wool, no expenditure was necessary. We are warmly appreciative of Mrs. Klein's devotion to the needy infants and we tender her our grateful thanks. Mrs. J. Kupfer, Mrs. Max Fineberg and Miss Ruth Hyams have earned our gratitude for their knitting service.

Mrs. J. Carin and Mrs. H. N. Dobrin are applying themselves enthusiastically, as co-chairmen of special service and car committee, to lending support, in particular to the work of the Children's Nursery Fund. During November and December Mrs. Carin reported the collection of \$249.00 thanks to the use of cars generously supplied by Mesdames Hugh Barnett, A. C. Benjamin, Saul A. Friedman, A. Naimark, S. Reitman, and D. Bernstein, to whom we are much indebted, as well as to those ladies of the board of directors who serviced these collections. By the quality of their service they are fast winning the esteem of their associates. We are grateful for their dependability for which we express a hearty thank you.

Mrs. Samuel Gasco and Mrs. Bernard Cohen, our co-chairmen of the clerical committee, merit a more than ordinary expression of appreciation for carrying a rather arduous burden for so large an organization. It is difficult to measure the demands made upon their time and energy in the voluntary discharge of their duties. The imposition of chairmanship of the nominating committee upon the shoulders of Mrs. Gasco was an added task which she assumed with her usual graciousness. For all of which I would personally express my gratitude to Mrs. Gasco and would assure both her and Mrs. Cohen that the Women's Auxiliary are keenly aware and appreciate deeply their invaluable service.

The surgical dressings committees, headed by Mrs. H. Naimer, Mrs. S. Steinberg, Mrs. Karl Druckman, Mrs. M. J. Messinger, Mrs. Morrie Levy and Mrs. J. Monaker have directed an effort giving considerable relief to the hard-working nursing staff. Meeting three afternoons a week in the hospital, they, together with the aid of large groups of ladies, have folded quantities of dressings. During the past year 184,285 dressings were prepared with an attendance of 983. Those who attended were given the cup of tea that cheers and they in turn contributed \$45.00 for this much enjoyed break. We would assure our chairmen and those who serve with them that they are rendering an important and much appreciated service for which we are truly grateful.

Mrs. Wm. Deskin, who as chairman of publicity is eminently suited to her assignment, has had the generous co-operation of The Montreal Star, The Gazette, The Standard, Kate Aitken's broadcast on CJAD, The Herald, The Canadian Jewish Chronicle, The Canadian Jewish Review, The Jewish Daily Eagle, The Westmount Examiner, The Monitor and Burnett's Town Crier. Their unflinching courtesy in publicizing our meetings and events have contributed considerably to our success. We extend to them our sincere appreciation, and we give Mrs. Deskin the assurance of our high esteem for her important contribution to the sum total of our efforts.

Mrs. Bernard Marks assumed the direction of enrolling a junior membership this year and reports a response from 102 girls. Dealing as we are with a high school and college age group, whose interests are not always clearly defined, it proved rather a difficult undertaking. With the medical library in the hospital as their specific supporting interest, we feel sure that Mrs. Marks will reach larger numbers in 1948. We extend to our chairman for her esteemed service, our gratitude and thanks and would assure our young members that we value their association with us.

Mrs. Isidore Ballon, our program chairman, provided our meetings with a series of interesting speakers on topics of general interest to our membership. Madame Pierre Casgrain, O.B.E., spoke to us on a subject of vital concern: "Married Women and the Civil Code"; Mr. Charles Rittenhouse gave an address on "Contemporary Canadian Theatres", which proved highly enjoyable; Mr. Christopher Ellis held our interest with a talk on "Some Truths about Radio"; while Mr. Louis Mulligan gave us "A Modern Slant in Decorating". All of which served to add a note of special interest to our general meetings. Mrs. Ballon merits our gratitude for her dependability, the graciousness of her service and for her enthusiastic interest in all that pertains to hospital welfare. We extend to her a hearty expression of appreciation and thanks.

Mrs. Ned Gross, chairman of telephone service, readily available to convene our executive meetings, is to be commended for her fine service. Her cheery concurrence with every request I made of her gave me a sense of gratitude for such reliability. I express to her our warmest thanks for her contribution to our efforts.



Mrs. M. I. Gordon, who as chairman of car service the first half of the year, herself provided cars on several occasions, gratefully acknowledges car service from Mesdames S. Lithwick, J. Lee, J. Stewart, A. C. Benjamin and Ned Gross. We would express to Mrs. Gordon and those who assisted her, our sincere thanks for their valued co-operation.

Mrs. Allan Bronfman, Jr., our amiable chairman of hospitality, provided a social note to our meetings which was a pleasant interlude in the business of the day. I appreciate particularly Mrs. Bronfman's meticulous attention to the arrangements for tea during the recent welcome visit to the hospital of our Honorary Patroness, The Viscountess Alexander of Tunis. We offer to Mrs. Bronfman the grateful thanks of her associates and we extend with her a warm welcome to her co-chairmen, Mrs. Samuel Held and Mrs. Aaron Schachter.

Mrs. Simon Rubin, chairman of the co-ordinating committee; Mrs. H. Levine who maintained our attendance records; Mrs. George Streat, Mrs. Karl Druckman and Mrs. J. Monaker who looked after Chanukah and seasonal gifts for the children in the hospital and staff, all helped to round out the smooth running of our undertakings. We extend to each of these ladies a hearty expression of thanks.

The Board of Directors, that group of stalwarts upon whom we lean heavily for aid, have given of themselves most generously to the tremendous task of facilitating our activities and services. I earnestly wish it were possible to mention each by name and to give a resume, however brief, of the measure of the individual service. As it is unfeasible within the confines of an annual report, I express to them collectively our profound sense of indebtedness for making possible the sum total of our achievement.
